EARLY CHILDHOOD IN THE COCHISE REGION

"After studying the needs of young children and families in our community, the Cochise Regional Partnership Council implemented several strategies in 2017. Through this work, children from lower income families throughout the Cochise Region are getting enrolled in star-rated Quality First child care centers to become prepared for kindergarten."

2017 COCHISE REGION HIGHLIGHTS

STRENGTHENING FAMILIES AND EARLY LITERACY

938 Families of newborns received the Arizona Parent Kit, filled with tips and tools to help support their child's healthy development.

184 Families received voluntary in-home coaching from trained providers to improve their parenting skills.

QUALITY PRESCHOOL AND CHILD CARE

- **1661** Children attended preschools and child care programs participating in Quality First.
 - **351** Children birth to age 5 received a Quality First scholarship to attend high quality preschools and child care programs.

PREVENTIVE HEALTH

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- 234 Children received screenings to detect vision, hearing and developmental issues to prevent learning challenges later on.
- **996** Flouride varnishes applied to protect against childhood tooth decay.

COCHISE CHILDREN GETTING STRONG ACADEMIC START THROUGH QUALITY FIRST PROGRAM

In the Cochise Region, families can find quality child care through First Things First's signature program Quality First. The program works with child care centers and preschools to improve early learning, giving families confidence that Quality First centers will provide excellent care while preparing their child for school.

"The council focused our funds into this strategy because research shows that children accessing quality early education get a strong start to kindergarten, setting them up for academic success in elementary, high school and even college," said Melissa Avant, FTF Cochise regional director. "After reviewing local statistics on academic performance, we determined that preparing children for kindergarten was a high need in the Cochise region."

Quality First assists child care centers and home programs in implementing evidence-based best practices for child care and early education. Quality First provides coaches to teach early educators about student-to-teacher ratios, lesson planning, training for serving children with special needs and many other aspects of early education.

"The Quality First programs in Cochise are raising the standard of early education in their region," said Leslie Totten, director of the FTF Quality First program. "Providing high quality care is costly for early care and education programs, so providing scholarships to families who couldn't otherwise afford this is definitely creating opportunities for success for children coming from households with high needs."

The FTF Cochise Regional Council invested more than half their allocated funds into providing scholarships for children to attend Quality First child care centers and home programs. In fiscal year 2017, 351 children living in the Cochise region received Quality First scholarships. Since 2013, the number of child care providers in the Cochise region rated at a quality level increased from 24 percent to 65 percent as of June 2017. This year, 1,661 children in Cochise County attended preschools and child care programs participating in Quality First.
