THIS RESULTS IN MORE KIDS READY FOR KINDERGARTEN

FISCAL YEAR 2018 COLORADO INDIAN RIVER TRIBES REGION IMPACT HIGHLIGHTS

Here are a few highlights of the proven programs and innovative strategies from this region.



STRENGTHENING FAMILIES AND EARLY LITERACY

- Books getting into the homes of infants, toddlers and preschoolers through a local distribution program.
- Resource guides were distributed to families, so parents could easily access support services and resources to help care for their children.
 - 32 Infants and toddlers involved with the child welfare system benefitted from training and coordinated efforts to meet their unique developmental needs.



QUALITY PRESCHOOL AND CHILD CARE

- **711** Children attended preschools and child care programs participating in Quality First.
 - Children birth to age 5 received a Quality First scholarship to attend a high quality preschool and child care program.



PREVENTIVE HEALTH

73 Educational sessions about nutrition and physical activity to reduce obesity in young children were held.

FIRST THINGS FIRST PARTNERS WITH CHILD CARE PROVIDERS TO IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF EARLY LEARNING IN THE COLORADO RIVER INDIAN TRIBES REGION

In the First Things First (FTF) Colorado River Indian Tribes region, families can access quality child care through First Things First's signature program Quality First, which partners with child care and preschool providers to improve the quality of early learning across Arizona.

With funding from the FTF Colorado River Indian Tribes Regional Partnership Council, Quality First provides quality improvements that research proves help children thrive, such as training and coaching for teachers to expand their skills and to help create learning environments that nurture the emotional, social and academic development of every child. Research shows that children exposed to quality early care and education, no matter the setting, are more ready for kindergarten, do better in school and are more likely to graduate and go on to college.

The Quality First program participants in the Colorado River Indian Tribes region are the Sonshine Center and the Colorado River Indian Tribes Head Start, which recently achieved a three-star quality rating. Quality First also helps preschools and child care centers to improve the way teachers work with infants, toddlers and preschoolers to create positive and consistent relationships that give young children the individual attention they need.

In addition, the Colorado River Indian Tribes region offers Quality First scholarships to some of the children enrolled in Sonshine Center a Quality First program. These scholarships, though limited, are designed to help eligible families afford quality early care and education for their young children.


In state fiscal year 2018, more than 211 children in the Colorado River Indian Tribes region had access to a higher standard of early learning through preschool and child care programs by participating in Quality First, and 30 of those children received a Quality First scholarship.
