THIS RESULTS IN MORE KIDS READY FOR KINDERGARTEN

## FISCAL YEAR 2018 COCHISE REGION IMPACT HIGHLIGHTS

Here are a few highlights of the proven programs and innovative strategies from this region.



#### STRENGTHENING FAMILIES AND EARLY LITERACY

- **784** Families of newborns received the Arizona Parent Kit, filled with tips and tools to help support their child's healthy development.
- Families received voluntary in-home coaching from trained providers to improve their parenting skills.



#### **OUALITY PRESCHOOL AND CHILD CARE**

- 1.232 Children attended preschools and child care programs participating in Quality First.
  - Children birth to age 5 received a Quality First scholarship to attend high quality preschools and child care programs.



#### PREVENTIVE HEALTH

- 315 Children received screenings to detect vision, hearing and developmental issues to prevent learning challenges later on.
- 1.516 Fluoride varnishes applied to protect against childhood tooth decay.

## FIRST THINGS FIRST PARTNERS WITH CHILD CARE PROVIDERS TO IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF EARLY LEARNING IN THE COCHISE REGION

In the First Things First (FTF) Cochise region, families can access quality child care through First Things First's signature program Quality First, which partners with child care and preschool providers to improve the quality of early learning across Arizona.

With funding allocated by the FTF Cochise Regional Partnership Council, Quality First provides quality improvements that research proves help children thrive, such as training and coaching for teachers to expand their skills and to help create learning environments that nurture the emotional, social and academic development of every child. Research shows that children exposed to quality early care and education, no matter the setting, are more ready for kindergarten, do better in school and are more likely to graduate and go on to college.

Quality First also helps preschools and child care centers to improve the way teachers work with infants, toddlers and preschoolers to create positive and consistent relationships that give young children the individual attention they need.

In addition, the Cochise region offers Quality First scholarships to some of the children. These scholarships, though limited, are designed to help eligible families afford quality early care and education for their young children.


In state fiscal year 2018, more than 1,232 children in the Cochise region had access to a higher standard of early learning through preschool and child care programs by participating in Quality First, and 388 of those children received a Quality First scholarship.

## **COCHISE REGIONAL COUNCIL**

The FTF Cochise Regional Partnership Council is made up of volunteers who study the unique needs of the local community and decide how funds will be used to best support the development, education and health of young children birth to age 5. FTF invests in proven programs and innovative strategies through grants to community organizations that provide services to children and families.
