## THIS RESULTS IN MORE KIDS READY FOR KINDERGARTEN

#### FISCAL YEAR 2018 GILA RIVER INDIAN COMMUNITY REGION IMPACT HIGHLIGHTS

Here are a few highlights of the proven programs and innovative strategies from this region.



#### STRENGTHENING FAMILIES AND EARLY LITERACY

- **8** Families received voluntary in-home coaching from trained providers to improve their parenting skills.
- **14** Teen parents were provided with parenting supports, with 11 teen parents enrolling in a voluntary series of parenting education classes.



#### QUALITY PRESCHOOL AND CHILD CARE

- **739** Children attended preschools and child care programs participating in Quality First.
  - **4** Preschools and child care programs participated in Quality First, receiving coaching, quality improvement supports, health consultation, and access to professional development.
  - **45** Children birth to age 5 received a Quality First scholarship to attend high quality preschools and child care programs.
  - **10** Early childhood educators received college scholarships to improve their skills in working with infants, toddlers and preschoolers.

# QUALITY FIRST PARTNERS WITH CHILD CARE PROVIDERS TO IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF EARLY LEARNING IN THE GILA RIVER INDIAN COMMUNITY

In the First Things First Gila River Indian Community region, families can find information about quality child care through First Things First's signature program Quality First, which partners with child care and preschool providers to improve the quality of early learning across Arizona.

Quality First funds quality improvements that research proves help children thrive, such as training and coaching for teachers to expand their skills and to help create learning environments that nurture the emotional, social and academic development of every child. Research shows that children exposed to quality early care and education, no matter the setting, are more ready for kindergarten, do better in school and are more likely to graduate and go on to college.

Quality First also helps preschools and child care centers to improve the way teachers work with infants, toddlers and preschoolers to create positive and consistent relationships that give young children the individual attention they need. In addition, the FTF Gila River Indian Community region offers Quality First scholarships to some of the children enrolled in a Quality First program. These scholarships, though limited, are designed to help eligible families afford quality early care and education for their young children.

In fiscal year 2018, more than 239 children in the Gila River Indian Community region had access to a higher standard of early learning through preschool and child care programs by participating in Quality First. And 45 of those children received a Quality First scholarship.

The FTF Gila River Indian Community Regional Partnership Council is made up of volunteers who study the unique needs of the local community and decide how funds will be used to best support the development, education and health of young children birth to age 5. FTF invests in proven programs and innovative strategies through grants to community organizations that provide services to children and families.
