Cocopah Indian Tribe

The Cocopah Indian Tribe, known as the River People, have lived along the lower Colorado River and delta for centuries, maintaining their traditions and culture throughout many political and environmental changes. The Cocopah are part of the greater Yuman-speaking peoples who have inhabited lands along the Colorado River for millennia have a largely oral language with histories being transmitted from generation to generation and through settler historical accounts documenting Cocopah life.

Established in 1917, the Cocopah Reservation comprises approximately 6,500 acres. Currently about 1,200 tribal members live and work on or near the Reservation. In 1964, the Tribe founded its first Constitution and established a Tribal Council.

Located 13 miles south of Yuma, AZ, the Reservation is home to Cocopah Casino, Cocopah Resort & Conference Center, Cocopah Rio Colorado Golf Course, Cocopah Museum, Cocopah RV & Golf Resort, Cocopah Speedway and Wild River Family Entertainment Center and Korner Store. Visitors enjoy golfing, gaming, shopping, learning about the Tribe's culture and taking in the great scenic beauty of the region.

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

While all children develop differently, it helps to know if your child is meeting typical milestones at different ages and stages and how you can support their healthy development. Why Early Childhood Matters

From birth to age 5, a child's brain grows more than at any other time in life. And early brain development has a lasting impact on a child's ability to learn and succeed in school and life. The quality of a child's experiences in the first few years of life – positive or negative – helps shape how their brain develops.



90% of Brain Growth Happens Before Kindergarten

At birth, the average baby's brain is about a quarter of the size of the average adult brain. Incredibly, it doubles in size in the first year. It keeps growing to about 80% of adult size by age 3 and 90% – nearly full grown – by age 5.

The brain is the command center of the human body. A newborn baby has all of the brain cells (neurons) they'll have for the rest of their life, but it's the connections between these cells that really make the brain work. Brain connections enable us to move, think, communicate and do just about everything. The early childhood years are crucial for making these connections. At least one million new neural connections (synapses) are made every second, more than at any other time in life.

The early years are the best opportunity for a child's brain to develop the connections they need to be healthy, capable, successful adults. The connections needed for many important, higher-level abilities like motivation, self-regulation, problem solving and communication are formed in these early years – or not formed. It's much harder for these essential brain connections to be formed later in life.



What is Quality First?

Quality First is a program of First Things First, Arizona's early childhood agency, that supports Arizona's child care providers, so they can support our young children. With over 1,200 participants, these programs are licensed and regulated, but participating in Quality First is voluntary. These programs are committed to quality improvement, going beyond regulatory requirements to help the infants, toddlers and preschoolers in their care be ready for success in school and beyond.

Quality Matters

90% of a child's brain growth happens before age 5, and the positive, nurturing relationships young kids have with adults — from parents to child care and early learning professionals — shape their learning now and throughout their lives.

Quality First Scholarships

Early care and education providers enrolled in Quality First may be eligible to offer Quality First Scholarships, which help lowincome families with children birth to age 5 afford quality child care. Many low-income families struggle to pay for quality child care. Some must choose between a job or leaving their children in care that is not their first choice. Quality First Scholarships help early care and education providers fill paid slots in their program and reimburse them for some of the expenses of providing quality (higher wages for more experienced and educated professionals, low staff-to-child ratios and small group sizes, etc.).

Find a Quality First Child Care Program Near You

Choosing a child care or preschool program for your young child is a big decision. Things like location, availability, hours and cost are important to consider, and so is the quality of the program. Research shows that quality early care and education programs help young children learn, grow and be ready for success in kindergarten and beyond.

Head Start & Preschools

Cocopah Head Start

Cocopah Head Start is a federally funded program that provides free services to support preschool and early learning/development, 3 to 5 years of age, as well as health and well-being for families that meet Head Start eligability guidlines. Head Start prioritizes services to families with lower income, children with special needs, families experiencing homelessness, or engaged in the foster care system, families receiving public assistance, and other families depending on circumstances and availability. Documents needed for eligibility: Original Birth Certificate; Current immunization records; Proof of income (tax form, TANF letter etc.); Guardianship documentation (if applicable); Physical Exam; Diagnoses (if applicable); Proof of insurance (AHCCCS, Kids Care, Private Insurance etc.); Proof of Residency; Proof of tribal enrollment (if applicable); Parent Identification.



And the early literacy skills needed to be a good reader – like language and vocabulary – start developing from birth. But it doesn't happen automatically. A child's brain is not pre-wired for reading.



When babies and toddlers hear words and language from caring adults, their brains develop the important connections needed to learn how to read. Studies show that children whose parents and caregivers regularly talk and read with them develop larger vocabularies, become better readers and do better in school. That's because the first few years of a child's life are when the brain grows and develops the most, and a child's experiences in these early years affect how their brain develops.

Language and early literacy developments starts from the very beginning. Babies are listening in utero, and once they're born, they're communicating through eye contact, facial expressions, crying, smiles and touch. When adults respond with words, conversation and attention, it helps build the child's brain in ways that promote healthy development and learning.

Johnson O'Malley Program

The Johnson O'Malley program is a math and reading program, with cultural and traditional values integrated for school age children entering kindergarten through 12th grade. The Johnson O'Malley Program is held during the summer months so all Native American school-aged children can participate.
